



Executive Manager's REPORT



The Legendary Genetic Magic of

Maxine & Mogul

When you talk about Marshfield Farms, you can't not talk about the pair of breed-impactful animals it produced: Mogul and his dam, Maxine.

Mountfield SSI DCY Mogul-ET is the youngest bull in history to surpass the mark for 1 million units of semen sold and ranks No. 4 for influence on the Holstein breed behind Elevation, Arlinda Chief and Oman. Mountfield Marsh Maxine was nominated for Holstein International's Global Cow of the Year for three consecutive years and was also named a New York Cow of the Century by the New York Holstein Association (NYHA). The two put Marshfield Farms on the map and made the farm's Mountfield prefix known among cattle breeders worldwide.

But what makes this a story for the ages is that it includes tears and tragedy, triumph and traction, and brings meaning to the phrase "timing is everything." While Maxine and Mogul were special for sure, it was their timing at the dawn of genomics that opened the door for their impact. In the mid-2010s, the new technology validated their genetic merit at record speed and brought everything together for the Marshfield family of Marcellus, N.Y.

Marshfield Farms LLC is operated by brothers Phil and Roger Marshfield, Phil's daughter and son-in-law, Amanda and Jeff Fitzsimmons, and their sons, Tyler, 10, and Lucas, nine. This salt-of-the-earth family has been operating the farm since the late 1800s and milking Registered Holsteins for

more than eight decades. For the Marshfields, just three things can interrupt the milking routine: the kids' birthday parties and baseball games, and Syracuse University basketball games.

Phil and Roger and their siblings grew up in an environment that nurtured a love for cattle. Their late parents, Elmer and Virginia, brought Registered Holsteins to the farm and developed a solid herd of 45-50 cows. The children were active in 4-H and attended Holstein functions, which were often family affairs because much of their extended family were also involved in dairy farming. So, it was natural for Phil to return home after he graduated from Cobleskill University with a major in animal husbandry in 1969 and farm

with his parents. Roger officially joined the team after high school graduation in 1972. A partnership was established in the early 1980s, and a limited liability corporation in the early 1990s.

Phil and his wife, Kathleen, provided that same cow-loving environment for Amanda and her siblings, Janette and Mike. Amanda followed in her father's footsteps and became a partner in the business after she graduated from Alfred State University in 2009.

Mountfield The Holsteins herd is 160 milking cows and 120 replacement heifers. Cows are housed in a pair of freestall barns and milked in a flat barn parlor. Calves are raised in hutches and a covered greenhouse barn, then moved to pens in the old renovated tie-stall barn and a covered hoop barn with pasture access. Corn, alfalfa and grass are grown on about 250 acres of owned and 150 acres of rented ground. Corn and a protein supplement are purchased. The family feeds a total mixed ration of corn silage, haylage and baleage.

The Pathway to World-Class Genetics

While the genetic base at Marshfield Farms has always been solid, the family made a strategic move to improve it in 1998 by implementing a flush program and purchasing elite genetics. Today, about 90 percent of the herd traces to three cows bought in a five-year period: Carters-Corner Manfred Azzi, Ever-Green-View Electra and Pine-Tree Missy Miranda-ET, dam of Maxine.

"We invested in well-known cow families because we believe good brood cows make more good brood cows," noted Roger. "We breed for type and pounds of fat and protein, choosing the highest type bulls we can without sacrificing production. Though it is nice to get a good show cow, we pay the bills here with the milk check."

A true breeder's herd, and Amanda is thrilled with the results. "We are milking the best group of cows we have ever milked. We used to have a few nice cows and some freestall cows. Today we have a group of beautiful-uddered high producers across the board," she

said.

The herd has a rolling herd average of 26,735 pounds milk, 1,116 pounds fat and 838 pounds protein, with tests of 4.2 percent fat and 3.1 percent protein. The herd includes 10 Excellent and 50 Very Good cows.

Among the favorites in the barn today are two members of the Miranda-Maxine family. Mountfield Shmrk Mento-ET is a VG-85 daughter of Maxine who is closing in on 300,000 pounds milk lifetime. She has five daughters, three of which are milking and classified VG. She is due to Has It All in October with twin heifers.

Mountfield RCR Macer-ET is an EX-93 granddaughter of Maxine, due with her seventh calf. She has lifetime credits nearing 200,000 pounds milk and two VG daughters that the Marshfields are confident will eventually score EX.

In the past 15 years, the Marshfields have sent 41 bulls to artificial insemination sampling programs. They regularly consign animals to sales and sell another 15-20 head of replacement females privately each year. Many have done well for their new owners, including a Diehard daughter that sold to Darin Meyer, De-Su Holsteins, of New Albin, Iowa, as a choice with Miranda in the Branson Limited Edition sale in 2004. A year later, she gave birth to a Watson daughter that was the No. 1 heifer in the nation for Genomic Type Production Index (GTPI) at one point and dam of De-Su 11236 Balisto-ET at ST Genetics.

Another consignment,

Mountfield Eliza-ET, was the first live lot to kick off the national Holstein convention sale in 2003. It was a memorable moment for Phil and Kathleen, who watched her cross the auction block in North Carolina.

For their cattle breeding acumen, Marshfield Farms was presented with NYHA Active Breeder Award. In presenting, former NYHA executive director and Holstein Association classifier Patsy Gifford of Groton, N.Y., aptly described the family's character on their journey to the top: "Early on, they didn't bode well with classification or sale consignments. But they worked, listened to those they trusted and moved forward.

"I remember going there for more than one sale. They would have a few that seemed to fit, but there was always a hole in the pedigree. There was no kicking the sawdust or negative comments, just a 'please don't forget us, and come back.' For the last Harvest Sale I selected, they greeted me at the car and Mandy's comment as we walked in the barn was, 'We've decided to top this sale.' They gave me the consignment that did just that. Mission accomplished - with perseverance, trust and belief in their goals and good judgment," she added.

The Miracle of Maxine & Mogul

Though the Maxine and Mogul story has been told before, it bears repeating as a reminder that miracles do happen. And they sometimes need some "Bibbidi-Bobbidi-Boo" - in this case, in the

scoring VG-88 with an EX mammary, a photograph, genomics and divine intervention.

"Looking back, if any one of those boxes had not been checked, things would not have fallen into place," noted Amanda.

The Marshfields recognized that Maxine was special from the beginning. She was the result of a flush for a contract mating between Miranda and Pasen Marsh-ET. Her full brother, Mountfield Melville-ET, headed to ABS Global and Maxine was flushed as a heifer to Shottle.

Maxine started her milking career with a bang in May 2008. The farm's first 2-year-old to give 100 pounds of milk and classify VG-88 with an EX mammary, the Marshfields had her photographed by John Erbson, who then called Select Sires and told them they needed to get to Marcellus fast to make a deal for Maxine.

within Rut weeks. two. everything changed for the worse. One evening when Maxine came into the barn for milking, the Marshfields noticed she was congested from her neck and brisket to her udder. With their regular vet out of town for Christmas, the family pulled some strings and got her into the veterinary hospital at Cornell University. The vet's diagnosis was a bacterial lesion on her heart valve.

Classifying her as terminal, they gave Maxine a survival prognosis of no more than two weeks. Cornell had just established its invitro

fertilization program, so they suggested Maxine be euthanized, and her ovaries sent to Trans-Ova.

The Marshfields could not come to terms with putting down such a special cow, and made the decision to bring Maxine home with the hopes of keeping her alive long enough to get just one more flush.

Coinciding with her trip to Cornell came a call from Rick VerBeek, a sire analyst for Select Sires, who expressed interest in buying Maxine. Roger spelled out the situation. Eager for Maxine's genetics in any form, Rick told him they would be interested in purchasing all embryos should the opportunity arise.

Maxine came home and was fed a diet with limited water and just hay. Every morning, someone ran to the barn to check on her, expecting the worst. But with tender loving care, prayers and a diehard constitution, she pulled through and became healthy enough to be flushed in early 2009.

It was the beginning of genomics, and after using several

proven bulls with less-than-desired results, VerBeek suggested a genomic young sire, Coyne-Farms Dorcy-ET. The Marshfields were

gung-ho about using genomics. The flush to the \$7 semen yielded two bulls that wound up in stud: Mogul and his brother, Mountfield SSI

DCY Mixer-ET. The Marshfields shipped the embryos to Select Sires in Plain City, Ohio, where they were implanted and the resulting calves were born.

"I still recall the day Rick got the genomic evaluations on Mogul and called us to say, 'We've got just one bull higher than yours," said Roger. "We were over the moon."

Mogul debuted as the second-highest-ranking young sire in the breed in December 2011 and became the top dog for GTPI in December 2014. Known as "Mr. Consistency," he was touted as an outcross sire and widely used for his ability to sire moderately-sized daughters with tremendous strength, beautiful udders, sound feet and legs and a will to milk. Not surprising - as these sound much like his dam.

Maxine, the zero-chance-ofsurvival kid, spent the rest of her days at Marshfield Farms, passing at 12 years of age in August 2018. She has more than 70 sons and daughters and is in the pedigree of other superior Registered Holsteins around the world.

The Marshfield 'Why'

While the Marshfields are passionate about breeding and caring for good cows, the farm is a means to an end. Family is the heart of their purpose and what gives meaning to life.

"The farm is the best place to raise a family, and the major reason I came back home," noted Amanda. "Tyler and Lucas work alongside Mom and Dad, Grandpa and Grand-Uncle Roger, and spend time with Grandma after school. Both want to be in the thick of things. They jump at the chance to help chop hay or work with the tester and beg to stay home from school when we classify.

"Their farm experience helps



them excel in everything they do, from schoolwork to baseball. They know what it means to be passionate about something, how to give 110 percent and to press on when the going gets tough."

It doesn't take Phil long to tell you, "Tyler, Lucas, my six other grandchildren and soon-to-be grandchild are some of my greatest blessings and joys."

"It means everything to me to be able to pass this farm and lifestyle to future generations," said Roger. "We are blessed in this regard, because I cannot tell you how many times I have been told: 'You're not big enough, you can't be competitive, there is too much work.' Somehow, we just keep going."

This effort gets tougher every

year, as Marshfield Farm is being encroached upon by the southwest suburbs of Syracuse and also lies north of the Finger Lakes region, a heavily frequented tourist destination. To ensure the farm will not be gobbled up by development, the family recently enrolled it in New York's Farmland Protection Implementation Grant program, commonly called Forever Green.

"We will invest funds in the farm to make sure it continues to look like the fields and pastures on which our family has been raised and made a living for generations," Roger explained.

Over the years, it has been a series of opportunities that paved the way for the family's success. Phil may sum it up best: "What it really boils down to is that God is watching over the farm, from

Maxine to Mogul and beyond. It is our job to be faithful stewards in the small things, do the right thing and trust that everything will fall into place as it is supposed to do."

Thus far, that plan has worked well for the Marshfield family.

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

I use a wide variety of bulls as I acknowledge every cow is different and I believe in order to breed the "ideal" cow out of a certain donor you must use not necessarily what's popular, but what best fits the cow. However, with that being said, my current favorite bull is Stantons

Alligator. What I like most about the bull is how consistent he is. The Alligators have great width and strength throughout, as well as super balanced and square, walk on great feet and legs, and are calving in great. I like to use Alligator on cows that need some help on correctness and feet and legs as I believe he is one of the best fixers in that area. Alligator is one of those bulls you can get away with almost anything on I believe as he is extremely consistent.

Another bull I use a lot of is Siemers Handsome, full brother to Siemers Hancock. Handsome came to my attention after I had seen multiple milking daughters and I saw the consistency of well complete, correct, balanced, great uddered, and awesome everyday

type of cows. I value bulls like him as they add some needed health traits to the show cows. Many show cows need a little more fight and strength and I greatly appreciate bulls like Handsome that add some of those needed health traits, while also still staying dairy and stylish.

I've also been using a lot of Unix. He might not make the show winning heifers, but they throw on great udders and make amazing cows. I like using Crushabull and Sidekick for the same reason.

Although I use many more younger bulls, I like to use older bulls occasionally like Goldwyn, Windbrook, and Dundee. They might be old, but I feel they still have a place and can be used effectively to produce the ideal cow.




